The Marriage of Medicine and Philosophy

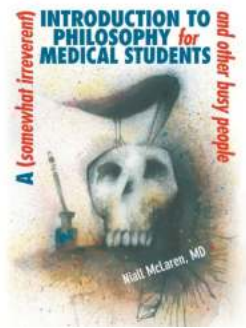
