Samuel catered the peace treaty between the United States and England and the Book of Negroes was written at his tavern before Evacuation Day. Like most others, Samuel and his family were left destitute after the war.

When George Washington was elected President several years later, Samuel was asked to become the First Steward to the First President's House of the United States where Sam, a free man of color, negotiated the often tension-fraught relationships with the white staff and Washington's black slaves. Samuel Fraunces established the protocols for future White House Head Ushers many of which are still used today.



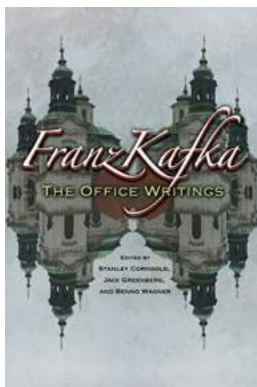
