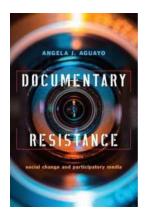

"Bowling for Columbine"

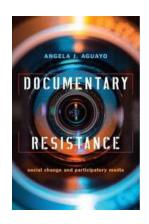
Michael Moore's documentary on gun violence in America invited viewers to join an online forum where they could engage in conversations about gun control, community organizing, and political activism.
