and the Soviet Union was a real possibility, the film is menacing, exhilarating, thrilling, insightful and very funny.

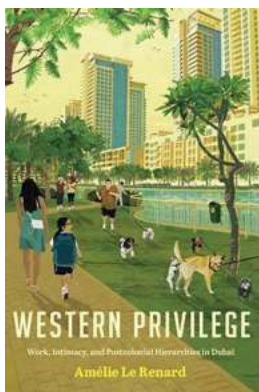
