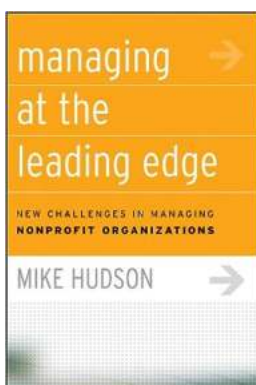

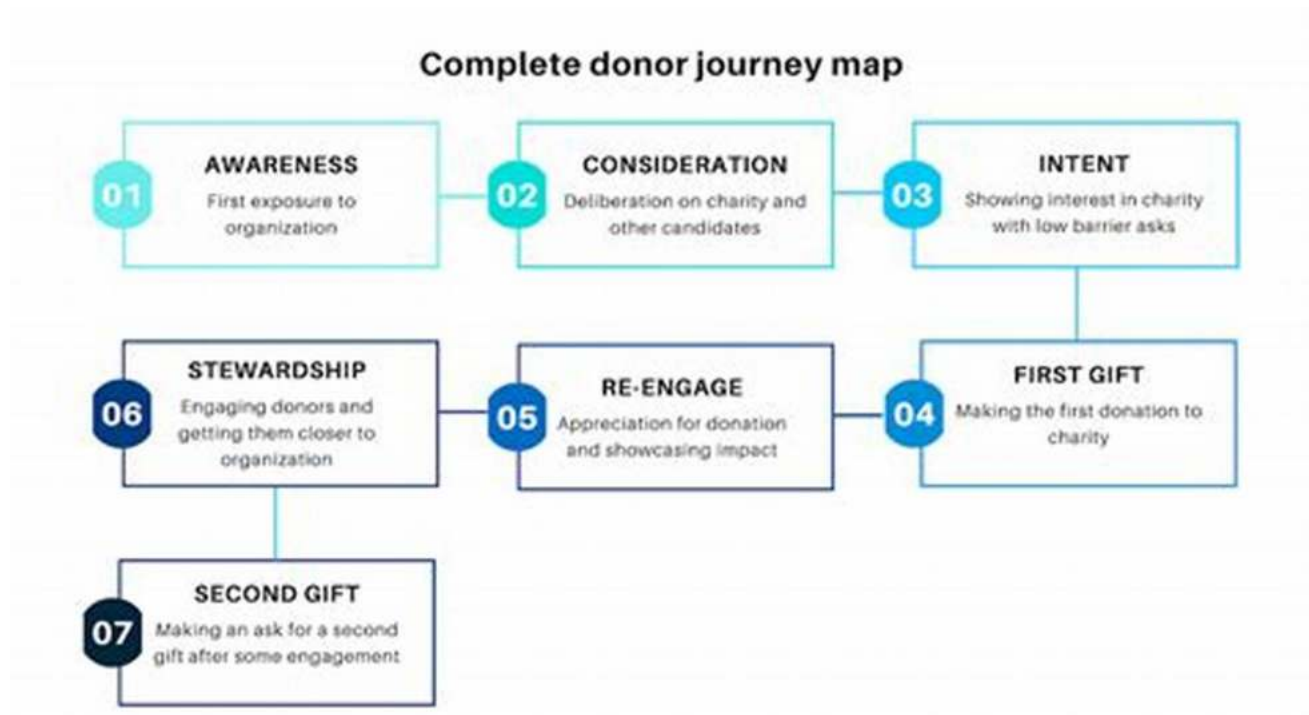

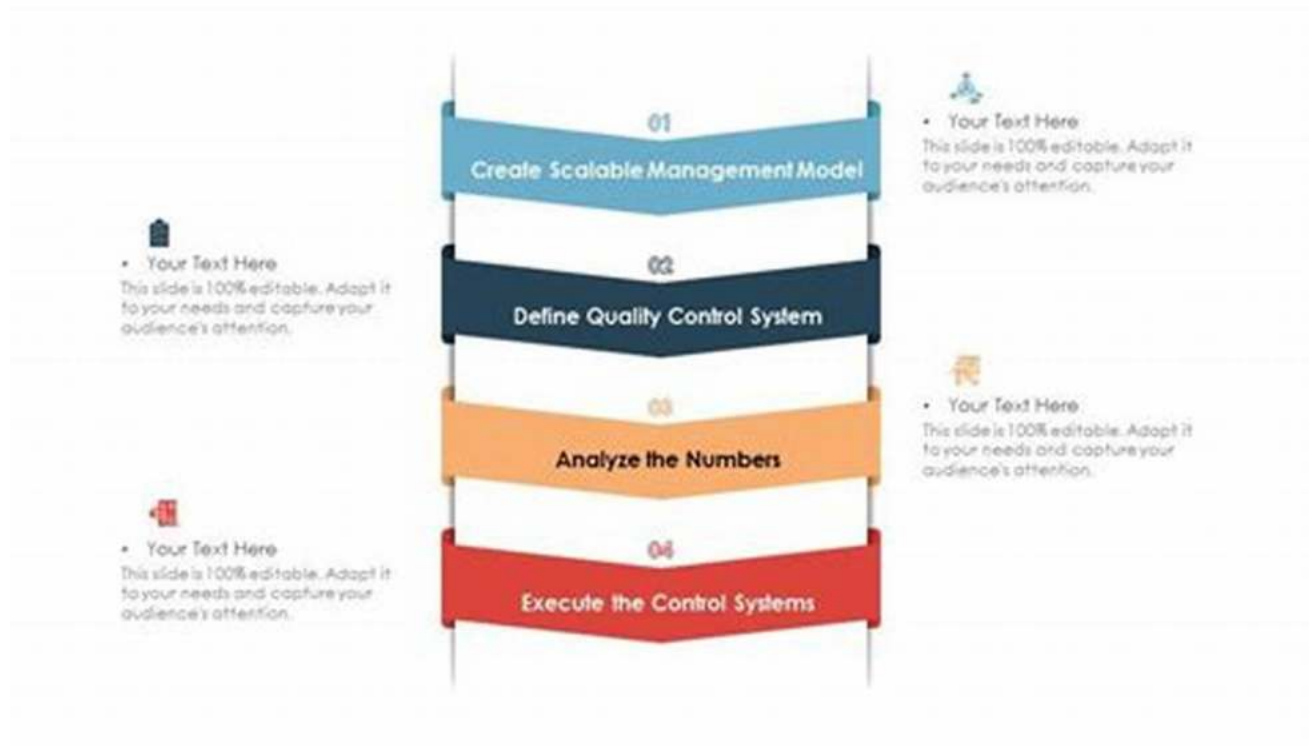

Four Stages of Managing Organizational Growth



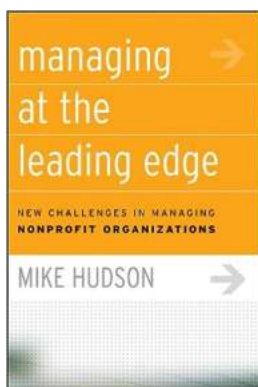
7. Nurturing a Diverse and Inclusive Culture
